First Reading: *Genesis 9:8-17*

God said to Noah and to his sons with him, “As for me, I am establishing my covenant with you and your descendants after you, and with every living creature that is with you, the birds, the domestic animals, and every animal of the earth with you, as many as came out of the ark. I establish my covenant with you, that never again shall all flesh be cut off by the waters of a flood, and never again shall there be a flood to destroy the earth.” God said, “This is the sign of the covenant that I make between me and you and every living creature that is with you, for all future generations: I have set my bow in the clouds, and it shall be a sign of the covenant between me and the earth. He was put to death in the flesh, but made alive in the spirit, in which also he went and made a proclamation to the spirits in prison, who in former times did not obey, when God waited patiently in the days of Noah, during the building of the ark, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were saved through water. And baptism, which this prefigured, now saves you—not as a removal of dirt from the body, but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers made subject to him.

**We teach that the Word, that is, the Son of God,
assumed human nature in the womb of the blessed Virgin Mary,
so that there are two natures, the divine and the human,
inseparably enjoined in one Person, one Christ,
true God and true man,
who was born of the Virgin Mary,
truly suffered, was crucified, died, and was buried,
that he might reconcile the Father unto us,
and be a sacrifice, not only for original guilt,
but also for all actual sins of humanity.
He descended into hell, and truly rose again the third day;
afterward he ascended into heaven
that he might sit on the right hand of the Father,
and forever reign and have dominion over all creatures,
and sanctify them that believe in him,
by sending the Holy Spirit into their hearts,
to rule, comfort, and quicken them,
and to defend them against the devil and the power of sin.
The same Christ shall openly come again
to judge the living and the dead,
according to the Apostles' Creed.
We also teach that we cannot be justified before God
by our own strength, merits, or works,
but are freely justified for Christ's sake, through faith,
when we trust that we are received into favor,
and that our sins are forgiven for Christ's sake,
who, by his death, has made satisfaction for our sins.
This faith God imputes for righteousness in heaven's sight. Amen.**

In the same way he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: "This cup is the new testament in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me."

Remembering, then, his death and resurrection, we take this bread and cup, giving you thanks that you have made us worthy to stand before you and to serve you as your priestly people.

Send your Spirit upon these gifts of your church; gather into one all who share this bread and wine; fill us with your Holy Spirit to establish our faith in truth, that we may praise and glorify you through your Son Jesus Christ; through whom all glory and honor are yours, almighty Father, with the Holy Spirit, in your holy church, both now and forever.

on earth as it is in heaven.**


