
St Mark Lutheran Church Service of Holy Communion

Preparation for Worship

Redeeming God, I do not know what lies ahead. I ask for strength and patience for myself, my family, and all who love and support me as we figure out what the future looks like. Gracious God, I know that you are always with me. Help me to feel your presence, especially at this time. I ask this in the name of Jesus. Amen.

†Confession and Forgiveness

Gathered the name of God — Father, Son and Holy Spirit — let us speak the truth:

God of justice, you know the guilt that I carry. You know the hurt I have caused. You know the harm I have done. You know the heaviness I hold.

And I know, too, what has brought judgment upon me.

I confess my sin, and I ask you to guide my life in the direction Jesus leads me. I ask for this: that you forgive my sins,

that I find forgiveness from those against whom I have sinned, that you help me forgive others, and that you help me forgive myself.

God of reconciliation, Jesus teaches us to love our enemies, to pray for them, and to do good even to those who hurt us. This is a hard teaching here, where we think of many as enemies. Show us the power of your transforming love. Prevent acts of retribution, drive out destructive anger, and hinder the spirit of revenge. Give us the courage to follow where you lead.

Praise to you, O God, for by your mercy I am united with Christ Jesus and in Christ I am forgiven. May I breathe in the peace of Christ now and rise in new life to follow Jesus' way. Amen.





Second Reading: Hebrews 5:5-10


A reading from Hebrews:

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, "You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place, "You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek." In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor.

"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

†Peace and Offering


The peace of Christ be with you always. **And also with you.**




God, creator of communion, companion in confinement:

Just before he was arrested, in the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying:

Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me. Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying:

This cup is the new testament in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Remembering Jesus' freedom & confinement, life & death, resurrection & ascension, we await the liberation of our lives in the rising of his gracious justice & righteous peace. Set free your Holy Spirit on us and on this simple bread and cup, that we may freely embrace Jesus' body and blood in, with and under this communion. 

The body & blood of our Lord Jesus Christ strengthen you & keep you in his grace. Amen.


Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God.

No Postlude Lent

This is a "No Postlude Lent" for us at St Mark, no final "alleluia."

It can be said that postludes are signals that the worship service is over and chatting can commence. If chatting, the postlude can be a nuisance. Another perspective is that a postlude can lift us up and send us forth with a renewed strength to carry into the world and in listening for this, chatting can be a nuisance.

*It can also be said that postludes are exclamations of "Alleluia!" When worship has moved us through prayer, supplication and communion, the final punctuation could be the final music of the worship hour, the postlude — *perhaps even serving as an "expression of the soul's exultation."

During Lent, our season of fasting from an organ postlude can be a time to ponder how we spend these few moments to conclude our personal worship and extend our service to the world for the sake of good news in Christ.

A Note on Receiving Holy Communion

Believing in the real presence of Christ, this church practices eucharistic hospitality. All baptized Christians are invited to receive Christ's body and blood; all people are welcomed to receive God's blessing in the love and life of Jesus for you today and always.

We share Christ's body and blood in bread and wine. After washing hands with rubbing alcohol, the pastor will dip the host into the cup and offer the bread and wine together; to receive the host without wine, please inform the pastor with words or by placing a hand on your chest. Truly Christ is fully present in each element separately. Christ is for you.

Communicants will come forward to the feast in continuous procession.

PJ's reflection on the Gospel

It's good that we remember there were Greeks who went to worship with believers in a God who wasn't theirs: their worship speaks of hope that "chosen people" holds within its smallness something large enough to draw in larger ways a larger whole—the whole of your humanity, a warmth to thaw if any deathly cold would cast a soul away for holding faith while not conformed to cultures and conditions set by folk like we are, folk who think religion's normed by our theologies. But heaven spoke in thunder of wide glory breaking new and Jesus claimed God's rising up for you.
